From the Mayor and Town Council...

Do You Know Where Your Property Taxes Go?

The Town receives many inquiries about property tax and, in particular, why property tax is so high. While a small portion of the property tax paid by Parker residents does come to the Town to support the general fund and operations, the majority is distributed to many different governmental organizations. For instance, on a home with an actual market value of \$300,000, the Town receives \$62 in property tax each year, while annually the Douglas County School District receives \$1,164; Douglas County Government receives \$472; and the Parker Fire Protection District receives \$313.

In 2014, the Town collected approximately \$1.4 million in property taxes compared to the Town's total 2014 revenue budget of just over \$96.8 million. Property tax collections of \$1.4 million would equate to the cost of employing 11 police officers, including salary, benefits, training, uniforms and all equipment needs.

The chart below provides a sample breakdown of the amount of property tax paid on a home in Parker and the amount that each organization receives, as well as what percent of the total tax bill it represents.

The Douglas County Assessor's office determines the property values on which property taxes are based and then the Treasurer's office collects and distributes the property taxes to all of the taxing jurisdictions in Douglas County. Parker Library Groundbreaking Held

Douglas County Libraries held an official groundbreaking May 18 for the new Parker Library that will be located at the corner of Mainstreet and Pine Drive. Residents and visitors will start seeing more construction progress at this site very soon! Expected completion of the new 37,000-square-foot library is mid-2016.

The new library is one piece of the Town of Parker's EastMain Development Project that will also include a new public park/plaza and a possible mixed-use development to help create a distinctive activity center in the downtown area.

Training Simulator Prepares Parker Police for Real-Life Scenarios

Imagine you are a police officer and have just been called to a local business due to a burglary alarm going off. You arrive at the business and see the front door broken open and can see flashlights reflecting off the back wall. Backup has arrived and you enter the building calling out, "Police, show us your hands!" You are faced by two suspects, but you can't see their hands. You repeat, "Show me your hands!" One suspect yells profanities at you while the other one reaches into his coat pocket...what would you do?

The Parker Police Department has purchased the Ti Trainer, a use-of-force simulator, with the intention of providing advanced training to our officers for the unpredictable environment in which he/she works. The 500-plus scenarios gauge officers' ability to handle a wide variety of situations where they might have to shoot a gun, fire a Taser or deploy pepper spray against a suspect(s).

During a scenario, officers face the simulator screen while an instructor selects the scenario and other variables for them. These pre-recorded scenarios are performed by actors, not animations, in a wide variety of common and not-so common occurrences faced by law enforcement. Officers are given modified weapons specific to the training simulator – including a firearm, Taser and pepper spray canister – to try to control the fast-moving situations.

Each scenario has one or more decision-making points where officers are evaluated on their reaction time, accuracy and the appropriateness of the force used. There is also a microphone feature which allows diversity within the scenario depending



on the officer's verbal commands. This allows latitude to de-escalate a potentially violent situation and not rely on the use of force.

The scenarios are divided into categories for a variety of law enforcement officers, including active-shooter situations, robberies, schools and courthouses. It also includes situations involving people under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol and/or suffering from mental illness.

The Parker Police Department places high value on the training of its sworn officers. Preparation is the key to survival – for both officers and civilians. In light of recent events around the country that have underscored the need for and importance of a more sophisticated training model for decision making, this simulation training comes at a critical point in law enforcement history.

Mainstreet Roadway Reconstruction Project Begins in June

In June, the Town of Parker will begin the roadway reconstruction of westbound Mainstreet (north lanes) from Motesenbocker Road to Jordan Road. The project will consist of removing the existing westbound concrete pavement and replacing it with asphalt pavement. As a result, the westbound lanes of Mainstreet will be closed and the existing eastbound lanes (south lanes) will be converted to two-way traffic (one lane each direction). This temporary four-lane to two-lane conversion will last approximately two months. It will cost approximately \$1.2 million to reconstruct these westbound lanes between the Motesenbocker Road and Jordan Road intersections.

Once the contractor has completed the reconstruction of Mainstreet through this section, the asphalt westbound lanes will be reopened to their current configuration. The Town expects to finish total reconstruction of this section of Mainstreet in 2016 when it replaces the eastbound lanes between these same intersections.

Practice Fireworks Safety

The Town would like to remind residents about the hazards of fireworks and the precautions they should take when using them.

“Safe and sane” fireworks are permissible only on private property within Town limits. All other fireworks are illegal and are prohibited in Parker, including on private property. “Safe and sane” fireworks include fountains, wheels, spinners, illuminating torches, dipped sticks, sparklers, snakes and glow worms. If you plan to set off fireworks, please keep fire danger in mind and take the following proper safety precautions:

- If you plan on setting off fireworks, do it outdoors in a clear area, away from houses, dry leaves or grass and other flammable materials.
- Keep a bucket of water nearby for emergencies and for pouring on fireworks that fail to ignite or explode.
- Do not try to relight or handle malfunctioning fireworks. Soak them in water and throw them away.
- Be sure other people are out of range before lighting fireworks.
- Never light fireworks in a container, especially a glass or metal container.
- Keep unused fireworks away from the firing area.
- Store fireworks in a cool, dry place. Always check instructions for special storage directions.
- Never have any portion of your body directly over a firework while lighting.
- Children should only be permitted to use fireworks under close adult supervision. Do not allow any running or horseplay. Be mindful that sparklers, often considered “safe” fireworks, burn at very high temperatures and can easily ignite clothing.

Fines of up to \$600 may be given for each offense. Contact the Parker Police Department at police@parkeronline.org or 303.841.9800 for more information on fireworks regulations.

At the time of print, the Town of Parker has not placed any additional restrictions on fireworks within Town limits. Please check the Town’s website, www.ParkerOnline.org, prior to using fireworks to ensure there is not a fire ban in place.

East/West Trail: Phase 1 Underway

The Town of Parker’s East/West Trail project is officially underway. Groundbreaking for Phase 1 of the project, which stretches from Jordan Road to Newlin Gulch Boulevard, was held in May with expected completion in July. The contract for Phase I was awarded to PLM Asphalt & Concrete for approximately \$400,000. Phase 2 of the East/West Trail project, which will stretch from Newlin Gulch Boulevard to Chambers Road, is currently under design with construction planned for 2016. When completed, the finished trail will stretch from Motsenbocker Road to Chambers Road.

Funding for this project comes from the half-cent Town sales tax dedicated to parks, trails, open space and recreational amenities. For more information on this project, please contact Parker Public Works at 303.840.9546.

Town and Urban Drainage to Expand Native Vegetation Management Strategy

The Town of Parker, in conjunction with the Urban Drainage and Flood Control District, will begin focusing on improving the health of the native vegetation in drainageways and detention basins within Parker. There are many corridors through Town where this approach is already in place, and the areas where Urban Drainage assists with maintenance will be added to the list in 2015 and beyond.

Previously, Urban Drainage hired contractors to mow these areas as a method of weed control. The Urban Drainage realized that mowing is not effective at eliminating weeds and, in some cases, actually spreads weeds. Mowing is also detrimental to native vegetation that requires a taller height to thrive and maintain health through the growing season and can encourage the grasses to go dormant prematurely during the hot summer months. This does not allow for natural reseeding and filling in of the good native vegetation, and it also can become dry during the months in which the area experiences the highest risk of wildfire.

Moving forward, Urban Drainage and the Town will collaboratively implement a program to control the weeds and allow the native vegetation to thrive and maintain its natural height. The areas previously maintained by Urban Drainage will continue to be treated for weeds and removal of debris and trash but will be nursed to a state of native vegetative health.

There will also be a free sunset concert at 7 p.m. on Saturday. More details on the performance will be available soon.


West Side Story

During the summer and fall of 2014, the Town of Parker reached out to the community through a number of channels and events to seek input regarding our Mainstreet corridor from Twenty Mile Road to Pine Drive. Through the outreach, the community shared its vision and dreams for Parker's downtown area. This is what we heard that you wanted in our Mainstreet corridor:

- More retail and restaurants to create a wider variety of shopping and dining choices and to lengthen the downtown experience
- More things to do throughout the day in downtown
- Infusion of public art adding to the creativity, character and culture of downtown
- A place for everyone - bicycles, pedestrians and automobiles
- Event-ready parks and plazas that also have daily activity such as spray gardens, ice skating, bocce ball courts, children's play areas and more

- Parking to relieve current issues for both residents and businesses
- Growth in downtown, but mindful of the scale and character of the area
- Keep it special!



The Town, with the help of a consultant, has taken this lofty list and is in the final stages of creating a draft Mainstreet Master Plan. The Plan is a long-range visioning document that will make recommendations on land use and development policy, urban design and circulation in the Mainstreet corridor to help achieve the community's goals. Watch for the public hearings before Planning Commission and the Town Council this summer.
