## Mainstreet Reconstruction Scheduled to Begin this Month

The Town of Parker will begin roadway reconstruction of westbound Mainstreet (north lanes) from Motesenbocker Road to Jordan Road early this month. The project was originally scheduled to begin in June but was delayed due to spring rains. Work will consist of removing the existing westbound concrete pavement and replacing it with asphalt pavement.


As a result of this project, the westbound lanes of Mainstreet will be closed and the existing eastbound lanes (south lanes) will

be converted to two-way traffic (one lane each direction). This temporary four-lane to two-lane conversion will last about two months. It will cost approximately \$1.2 million to reconstruct these westbound lanes between the Motesenbocker Road and Jordan Road intersections.

Once the contractor has completed the reconstruction of Mainstreet through this section, the asphalt westbound lanes will be reopened to their current configuration.

The Town expects to finish total reconstruction of this section of Mainstreet in 2016 when it replaces the eastbound lanes between these same intersections.

The Town of Parker's 11-week Civic Academy returns this fall, and the application process is now open! Participants will learn what it takes to build, grow and maintain a community. From Town infrastructure to innovative ways of maximizing tax dollars, attendees get a first-hand look at how their local government operates. The academy will be held on Wednesday nights from 5:30 to 8 p.m. at the PACE Center. Classes will run from Sept. 2 through Nov. 4, with a graduation ceremony on Nov. 16.

### ***Dealing with Mosquitoes***

Thanks to a wet spring, mosquitoes are out in swarms. Here's some quick information on how to cope with these insects and the Town of Parker's role in combating them:

- Parker does not spray for mosquitoes due to the harmful effects to surroundings, not to mention to people.
- Stormwater crews consistently monitor areas of standing water for West Nile Virus and other harmful pathogens.
- Parks crews do their best to keep grasses, where mosquitoes tend to dwell, mowed around parks and trails.
- Mosquitoes are worst during cool times throughout the day (morning and evening) and when the air is calm (no wind).
- Your mild defense against mosquitoes and other biting insects is bug spray containing DEET.
- A better defense against mosquitoes is to cover up with pants and a long-sleeved shirt.

## Emergency Operations Center Activated During Parker Days

Members from the Town of Parker's Incident Overhead Team activated Parker's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) during the annual Parker Days Festival this year.

Parker Days, put on by the Parker Area Chamber of Commerce, falls within the first two weeks of June each year and with that brings unpredictable spring weather. The festival attracts people of all ages, which creates a greater responsibility for the Parker Police Department to maintain public safety from both natural and man-made disasters. The Town's Incident Overhead Team is designed and trained to respond and operate effectively during any type of disaster or critical incident.

The activation was an opportunity to utilize the EOC during a planned event and test capabilities, functionality, maintain situational awareness and train staff. Severe weather kept staff busy while providing updates to event staff and the Incident Commander on scene during the festival. Predetermined shelters were opened and utilized for severe weather during the event and public information officers provided continuous updates to the public via social media sites. New technologies were also tested and the team was able to provide valuable feedback on the efficacy of the EOC activation and oversight in an after-action plan.

Emergency Operations Centers are designed to operate smoothly in a time of crisis and support the incident or event. They demand clear operating procedures and staff roles and responsibilities, as well as a supportive workspace, safe location and effective usable technology. Parker's EOC is located in the Parker Police Department and is typically staffed with the Town's Incident Overhead Team. The team includes members from every department across the Town, including elected officials and department heads. Staff have been extensively trained in order to prepare for significant incidents and planned events. Key staff members assist in planning table-top exercises, plan and participate in full-scale exercises, prepare citizens for disasters, deploy to other jurisdictions when requested, establish relationships with local organizations and businesses, assist with mitigation and recovery plans and more.

Most recently, trained staff from the Town of Parker have been utilized during flooding and wildfires across the state of Colorado, which is invaluable to the EOC Team.

Parker's National Night Out 2015, a FREE event sponsored by the Parker Police Department and Town of Parker, is designed to promote neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships. From 2 to 8 p.m. on Aug. 8, residents in neighborhoods throughout Parker are invited to O'Brien Park to enjoy games, face painting, vendor booths, child fingerprint identification kits and military, police and fire participation. Children can play lawn games, basketball, kickball and more with police officers from 2 to 6 p.m. Vendor booths will be set up from 4 to 8 p.m.

Stick around after the event for a kid-friendly movie in the park at dusk sponsored by the Parker Area Chamber of Commerce. Bring your lawn chairs and blankets to enjoy concessions, games and the movie "Frozen." A special visit by the Snow Queen and Snow Princess will be a highlight of the evening from 6 to 8 p.m.

The 32nd Annual National Night Out crime and drug prevention event will involve more than 16,000 communities from all 50 states, U.S. territories, Canadian cities and military bases around the world. The program is designed to heighten crime and drug prevention awareness; generate support for and participation in local anticrime efforts; strengthen neighborhood spirit and police-community partnerships; and send a message to criminals letting them know neighborhoods are organizing and fighting back.

## Roadway Maintenance Projects Update

The Town of Parker budgets roughly \$4 million per year for roadway maintenance through a competitively bid contract process. This approach helps ensure that the Town receives the best value on the capital that is invested on behalf of taxpayers. Projects can include a variety of types of work, including pavement preservation, rehabilitation and reconstruction and concrete maintenance.

This year's roadway maintenance projects have been targeted to impact the following residential areas: Bradbury Ranch, Canterbury, Clarke Farms, Cottonwood, Hidden River, Parker Vista and Stroh Ranch. Additional work will be performed on the following roadways: Hilltop Road, Chambers Road, Twenty Mile Road, Mainstreet, Pine Lane and Crown Crest Boulevard.

Among the frequent questions the Town receives from residents is why some roadways, sidewalks and gutters that appear to be in good condition are subjected to these types of

maintenance. The cost to perform preventative maintenance of a roadway helps to keep streets in optimal condition much longer than waiting for signs of bigger distress. Similar to maintaining your car, it is better and more cost effective to perform this preventative maintenance rather than waiting for noticeable problems to arise. Also, when streets are resurfaced by methods that remove more than the top one-and-half inches of pavement, all intersections must be brought into compliance with current ADA (American's With Disabilities Act) standards. Old ramps often have to be removed and replaced to conform to maximum slope and landing requirements and to install detectable warning panels (truncated domes) to allow people with visual disabilities to determine the boundary between the sidewalk and the street.
